TCT Presents RODGERS & HAMMERSTEIN'S

arousel, written by Richard → Rodgers and Oscar Hammerstein II, tells the story of a swaggering, carefree carnival barker, Billy Bigelow (Rick Brooks), who captivates and marries a naive millworker, Julie Jordan (Jauna Ellis). Billy loses his job just as he learns that Julie is pregnant and, desperately intent upon providing a decent life for his family, he is coerced into being an accomplice to a robbery. Caught in the act, and facing the certainty of prison, he takes his own life and is sent "up there." Billy is allowed to return to earth for one day fifteen years later, and he encounters Louise, the daughter he never knew (Caitlin Milne). She is a lonely, friendless teenager, her father's reputation as a thief and bully having haunted her throughout her young life. How Billy instills in both the child and her mother a sense of hope and dignity is a dramatic testimony to the power of love. Both Richard Rodgers and Oscar Hammerstein said that Carousel was the favorite of their works together. They broke new ground in musical theater storytelling

with their extended music/dialogue scenes, such as "If I Loved You" and, hauntingly, the "Soliloquy" (where Billy imagines his future child). The final anthem "You'll Never Walk Alone" has taken on a life of its own and is one of the most beloved songs in theatre history

This talented cast also features: Mickey Gousset (Enoch Snow), Stuart Rial (Enoch Snow, Jr.), Robert Gatlin (Jigger Cragin), Monica Roden Spencer (Nettie Fowler), Ann Britt (Carrie Pipperidge), Lisa Kimes (Mrs. Mullin), David Neilsen (Starkeeper/Dr. Seldon) and Otis Tims (Mr. Bascombe). Carousel is directed by Sonja Jenkins, with Susan Tims serving as Assistant Director. The Musical Director is Debra Robison and choreography is by Sarah Karrant. Set design is by Marianna Coffey and the lighting designer is Bronwyn Teague.




us May 7, 8 and 9 for another great TCT production!


2009-2010 Season Announced

Comedy, music, drama and more music will command the Lyric Theatre spotlight in 2009-2010 when Tupelo Community Theatre offers something for everyone in its fortieth season.

Crowns, a play with music, and All Shook Up, the Gum Tree musical production, are the bookends of the season, with a pair of truly Southern comedies, Dearly Beloved and Catfish Moon, in between – plus a night of one-act plays. None of these shows have been performed by TCT before.

"Trying to pick just five shows is downright difficult," said Danny McKenzie, chairman of the play selection committee. "The committee worked really hard to come up with a balanced season — mixing a good bit of comedy, a whole lot of music and some pretty deep drama. We're excited about next season and think it will be one of the best TCT has ever offered."

CROWNS – An endearing play with music is a tribute to the color-



ful church hats and the African-American women for whom they are symbolic crowns, a means to express themselves in the presence of God.

DEARLY BELOVED – The story of a completely dysfunctional but loveable Texas family in the throes of a series of life-changing events. The Futrelle Sisters are throwing a wedding while the rumor mill in their small town of Fayro, Texas, is working overtime.

NIGHT OF ONE ACTS – TCT presents *Rabbit Hole*, a Pulitzer Prize winning drama focused on a couple trying to cope with the

death of their four-year-old child, and another one-act play in a much lighter mood.

CATFISH MOON –
Brookhaven native Laddy Sartin
offers an hilarious Southern-fried
look at fishing, beer and the meaning of life, particularly as it pertains
to aging, friendship and the struggle between men and women – or
more precisely, the struggles
between men over women.

ALL SHOOK UP – Elvis and Shakespeare: A jukebox musical featuring the music of the Tupelo's own Elvis Presley, with a story based (very) loosely on the plot of Shakespeare's Twelfth Night. *All Shook Up* is a musical audience members can sing along and laugh along with.

Roxie Thomas, a graduate of Tupelo High School, the University of Mississippi, and Shenandoah University, will return to Tupelo to produce an evening of dance on July 17, 2009, at 8:00 p.m. "I

wanted to come home and share this dance concert with the people and community who have supported and encouraged me throughout the years." This multicultural dance company will perform original choreography created by Roxie over the past three years. "The concert will consist of recreations of some of my earlier works. It is also important for me to have pieces that deal with the cultural South. I will create works based on the devastation of the Mississippi Gulf Coast after Hurricane Katrina, a dedication to Elvis Presley and a piece titled Southern Suite, which is an interpretation of my childhood, growing up in the




